National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) declares May-Mental Health Awareness Month



Since its inception in 1949, Mental Health Awareness Month has been a cornerstone of addressing the challenges faced by millions of Americans living with mental health conditions. This year NAMI is celebrating with the <u>Take the Moment campaign</u>. A campaign that encourages "you to join in fostering open dialogues, cultivating empathy and understanding. This campaign also champions the importance of destigmatizing mental health by normalizing the practice of taking moments to prioritize mental health care without quilt or shame."

But what does this have to do with social justice? Well, insurance companies still have inadequate plans to cover all the different types of mental health services, patients who identify as LGBTQ or who wish to work with counselors who represent their diversity cannot find providers, people who suffer with mental illnesses fill jails and prisons not getting the treatment they need, and communities' budgets are eliminating some of the key services that people need to have a successful recovery. There is much work to be done in mental health system reform on many different levels. The easiest way to start is to take a moment for your



mental health, tell people it is a priority, and encourage them to do the same.

In 2018 several individual UUs interested in mental health started meeting and jointly decided that the time was right to form a Unitarian Universalist Mental Health Network to work collectively on mental health challenges that affect congregations and society at large. The Mission: To empower the Beloved Community in honoring each individual's unique mental health journey towards wellness. The UUMHN "envisions a world where the Beloved Community: is a place where all members feel welcomed, understood, and held in love; engages in



respectful curiosity to understand emotional distress; welcomes open, authentic, and fearless sharing about mental health; and passionately commits to mental health justice." Restructuring the Social Justice Council

No separate Teams, but the Mission remains the same.



During the first few Social Justice Council meetings it became clear that in planning projects and events many of the issues encompassed the work of more than just one Team. Next, there was concern events' dates and times may overlap, prohibiting members from attending activities. Then came the issue of volunteer burnout and splitting the interests of members if they "had to choose a Team." Finally, trying to split the resources and financial support may make certain projects impossible. Therefore, it was decided that the Social Justice Council would be one Team with focus areas on the topics covered by each previous team.

The Council's <u>purpose and mission</u> reads as such: The Social Justice Council is a consortium of members and consolidation of work to create a strategic approach to meeting the needs of the community, providing education & engagement, and coordinating efforts to create larger community change by being good stewards of time, talent, and financial support.

Instead of having separate teams with separate meetings, all participants will meet once a month to ensure consolidation is occurring. With one meeting we can better plan activities that take into consideration all sides of the issues and share resources more effectively. The work will still focus on the following areas: Advocacy, Anti-Racism (ARC), Social Action, and building a Welcoming Congregation for members who identify as LGBTQIA2s. Moreover, we will continue to track local, regional, state, and national issues. We are committed to offer a wide range of ways to get involved and recognize the benefits of combining our work with social justice partners to make a greater impact in a Beloved Community.

Everyone is welcome! There is no level of required commitment—you may participate in projects that suit you best in the time available to you. Bring your passion, ideas and dedication!

UU the Vote 2024

BUILDING FOR THE LONG HAUL

Congregations and members across the country are preparing, organizing

and implementing the UU the Vote 2024 campaign.

This year five states have been designated as "BUILDING FOR THE LONG HAUL": Michigan, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Texas, and WISCONSIN. This means that UU the Vote trainings, leadership opportunities and additional communications with the State Action Networks will continue to create momentum, build power, and organize for impact.

Five states have been identified as "WIN ON THE ISSUES": Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Georgia and Idaho. Coordinated campaigns with the State Action Networks in Arizona, Colorado and Florida will work to protect and expand access to abortion care. In Georgia, the work focuses on Stop Cop City and police militarization. And in Idaho, efforts are being made to push back on white supremacists and expand the electorate.

Each of you are encouraged to read the <u>2024 Launch</u> Guide, watch the videos, and get active.
